Schedule of Readings/Viewing and Weekly Content

Week I

<u>The Enduring Detective</u> – Introduction, Arthur Conan Doyle biography and history, adaptations and artifacts, major themes.

Doyle, "The Red-Headed League," "The Greek Interpreter," "A Case of Identity," and "The Man with the Twisted Lip."

Please have in mind any and all adaptations or any other artifact related to Sherlock Holmesiana.

Week II

<u>Deduction and Diagnosis</u> – Late nineteenth century epistemology, comparison of the methods of Freud and Homes, diverging notions of selfhood and psychology.

Doyle, A Study in Scarlet, Part I

Although I will not focus on it at length, you may also wish to read Part II.

Freud, The Question of Lay Analysis.

Week III

<u>Science and Superstition</u> – Doyle's supernaturalism, theories of the dream, late nineteenth century science, empiricism, religion, and spiritualism.

Freud, selections from *The Interpretation of Dreams*.

Doyle, "The Leather Funnel," "Through the Veil," and one or two other stories from the *Supernatural Tales*.

Week IV

Colonial Fictions – "The Definitive Englishman," masculinity, British colonialism; Doyle, history, and imperialism.

Doyle, "The Speckled Band," The Sign of Four

Week V

<u>The Modern Sherlock</u> – 21st century visions with an emphasis on the figure of The Woman, Watson, and the idea of the unlikable addicted genius.

Selected episodes from *Elementary*, *Sherlock* and *House*.

Doyle, "Scandal in Bohemia" and one or two other stories.

Week VI

<u>Law and Identity</u> – Course wrap-up, return to major themes, particularly identify and selfhood.

Doyle, "The Blue Carbuncle," and "The Musgrave Ritual"
