# **Contemporary Turkey in Context: Culture, Power and History**

A Humanities Seminar

10 weeks 3 hrs per week

Turkey is one of the world's most populous Muslim-majority countries (with some 80 million people), is a member of NATO and has been a candidate for entry into the European Union for over ten years. Since 2002 the country has undergone rapid and profound changes under the rule of the Justice and Development Party and its leader Tayyip Erdogan. These changes include a growth-oriented economy, massive infrastructural investment, softening of the country's secularist ideology, a transformed foreign policy oriented toward economic and political engagement, and in recent years controversial steps often described as 'authoritarian' by observers both inside and outside the country. What is 'really going on' in Turkey? How might we understand where Turkey is going? This ten-week, three hours a week course explores the contemporary history, culture, economy and politics of Turkey. We will briefly look at historical developments from the late 19<sup>th</sup> century Ottoman Empire to the late 20<sup>th</sup> century Republic of Turkey, with an emphasis on recent decades and current events. Course time will consist of lectures by the course coordinator, Dr. Silverstein, as well as UA experts on Turkey (of which we are fortunate to have several). Each week will be organized around a 'theme,' explored in depth by the coordinator, and on some occasions with a special presentation by a UA faculty member whose scholarship furnishes them with considerable expertise on the topic at hand.
