## **Contemporary Poetry Through Four Lenses**

Course Description: In a letter to Thomas Higginson, Emily Dickinson used these words to describe poetry: "If I read a book and it makes my whole body so cold no fire can warm me, I know *that* is poetry. If I feel physically as if the top of my head were taken off, I know *that* is poetry." Marianne Moore described poetry in her poem by the same title as imaginary gardens with real toads in them. To get a sense of American poetry in our contemporary moment, we will explore four different ways of approaching contemporary poetry. In each class in this fourweek course, we will focus our reading and discussion on poetry that is emblematic of contemporary lyricism; form and playfulness, explorations of language and how language goes about the work of meaning; and the spectrum of the personal and public. The course will sample a range of contemporary poets and feature a sequence of invitations to respond to course reading in various ways.

**Required Texts**: There are no required texts to purchase. Reading packets for each session will be uploaded to and available as .pdf documents on Box @UA. Registered students will receive a link to this site by May 1<sup>st</sup>.
